The English Revolution 1642-1649 2020 The English Civil Wars and Revolution remain controversial. This book develops the theme that the Revolution, arising from the three separate rebellions, was an English phenomenon exported to Ireland and then to Scotland. Dr Kennedy examines the widespread effects of years of bloody and unnatural civil wars upon the British Isles. He also explores the symbolism of Charles I's execution, the 'great debates' about the proper limits of royal authority and the 'great divide' in English politics which makes neutral writing about this period impossible. Taking into account the radical exigencies and expectations of war and peace-making, and discordant testimonies from battlefield and bargaining table, Parliament, press and pulpit, Dr Kennedy provides a full analysis of the English experience of revolution.

Formal Logic Dec 24 2021 The first beginning logic text to employ the tree method--a complete system of first-order logic that is remarkably easy to understand and use--this text allows students to take control of the nuts and bolts of formal logic quickly, and to move on to more complex and interesting problems. The tree method is elaborated in manageable steps over five chapters, in each of which adequacy is reviewed; soundness and completeness proofs are extended at each step, and the decidability proof is extended at the step from truth functions to the logic of nonoverlapping sets with a single variable, after which undecidability is demonstrated by example. The first three chapters are bilingual, with arguments presented twice, in logical notation and in English. The last three chapters consider the discoveries defining the scope and limits of formal methods that marked the coming of age in the 20th century: Gödel's completeness and incompleteness theorems for first-order second-order logic, and the Church-Turing theorem on the undecidability of first-order logic. This edition provides additional problems, solutions to selected problems, and two new Supplements: Functional Equivalence reinstates material on that topic from the second edition that was omitted in the third, and Variant Methods, in which John Burgess provides a proof regarding the possibility of modifying the tree method so that it will always find a finite model when there is one, and another which shows that a different modification--once contemplated by Jeffrey--can result in a dramatic speed--up of certain proofs.

Studies in the History of the English Language Aug 27 2022 This volume collects essays that approach notions of creating, maintaining, and crossing boundaries in the history of the English language. The concept of boundaries is variously defined within linguistics depending on the theoretical framework, from formal and theoretical perspectives to specific fields and more empirical, physical, or perceptual angles. The contributions to this volume do not take one particular theoretical or methodological approach but, instead, explore how examining various types of boundaries—linguistic, conceptual, analytical, generic, physical—helps us illuminate and account for historical use, variation, and change in English. In their exploration of various topics in the history of English, contributors address a range of questions: what does it mean to set up boundaries between time periods? When do different varieties have distinct boundaries and when do they overlap? Where do language users draw

constructional, semantic, phonetic/phonological boundaries? Thus, the chapters explore not only how boundaries illustrate synchronic and diachronic features in the history of the English language but also what we can discover by questioning perceived or actual boundaries.

The Mathematical Theory of Thermodynamic Limits **Jul 19 2021** The thermodynamic limit is a mathematical technique for modeling crystals or other macroscopic objects by considering their infinite periodic arrays of molecules. The technique allows models in solid state physics to be derived directly from models in quantum chemistry. This book presents new results, many previously unpublished, for a large class of models and provides a survey of the mathematics of thermodynamic limit problems. The authors both work closely with Fields Medal-winner Pierre-Louis Lions, and this book will be a valuable tool for applied mathematicians and mathematical physicists studying partial differential equations.

The Knights Hospitaller of the English Language 1460-1530 2019 The Knights of St John of Jerusalem, also known as the Hospitallers, were a military religious order, subject to monastic discipline but devoted to the active defence of the Holy Land. After evacuating the Holy Land at the beginning of the fourteenth century, they occupied Rhodes, which they held into the sixteenth century when their headquarters moved to Malta. Branches of the order existed throughout Europe, and an English branch in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries that is examined here. Among the major issues researched by O'Malley are the recruitment of members of the Hospital and their family ties; the operation of the order's career structure; the administration of its estates; its provision of social and charitable services; and the publicity and logistical support it provided for the holy war carried on at its headquarters against the Ottoman Turks. It is argued that the English Hospitallers in particular fulfilled their military and financial duties to the order very seriously, making a major contribution to the Hospital's operations in the Mediterranean as a result. They were able to do so because they were wealthy, had close family and other ties with gentle and mercantile society, and above all because their activities had royal support. Where this was lacking or ineffective, as in Ireland, the Hospital's operations became the plaything of local interests eager to exploit its estates, and its wider functions were neglected. Consequently the heart of the book lies in an extended discussion of the relationships between senior Hospitaller officers and the governing authorities of Britain and Ireland. It is concluded that the rulers were generally supportive of the order's activities, but within strict limits, particularly in relation to appointments, the size of payments to the east, and the movement and foreign allegiance of senior brethren. When these limits were breached, or at times of political or religious sensitivity, the 1460s and 1530s, the Hospital's personnel and estates would suffer. In addition, more general issues of historical debate are illuminated such as those concerning the relationship between late medieval societies and the religious orders; 'British' attitudes to Christendom and holy war, and the rights of rulers over their subjects. This is the first such book to be based on archival records in both England and Malta, and will make a major contribution to understanding the order's European network, its role in the ordering of Latin Christendom, and in particular its role in late medieval British and Irish society.

Lord Sumption and the Limits of the Law **Her 17** 2021 In Lord Sumption and the Limits of the Law, leading public law scholars reflect on the nature and limits of the judicial role and its implications for human rights protection and democracy. The starting point for this reflection is Lord Sumption's 'The Limits of the Law', which grounds a wide-ranging discussion of questions including the legitimacy of judicial law-making, the interpretation of the European Convention on Human Rights, the continuing significance and legitimacy, or otherwise, of the European Court of Human Rights. The Limits of the Human **Mar 27** 2022 Felicity Nussbaum examines literary and cultural representations of human difference in England and its empire during the long eighteenth century, with a special focus on women's writing. Nussbaum analyzes canonical and lesser-known novels and plays from the Restoration to abolition. She considers a range of anomalies (defects, disease, and disability) as they intermingle with ideas of femininity, masculinity, and race to define normalcy as national identity. Incorporating writings by Behn, Burney, and the Bluestockings, as well as Southern, Shaftesbury, Johnson, Sterne, and Equiano, Nussbaum treats a range of disabilities - being mute, lame - and physical oddities such as eunuchism and gigantism as they are inflected by emerging ideas of a racial femininity and masculinity. She shows that these corporeal features, perceived as both ordinary and extraordinary, combine in the popular imagination to reveal a repertory of differences located between the extremes of splendid and horrid novelty.

Frequency Effects in Language Acquisition **Sep 08** 2020 The book addresses a controversial current topic in language acquisition studies: the impact of frequency on linguistic structure in child language. A major strength of the book is that the role of input frequency in the acquisition process is examined across a large variety of languages, topics and the two major theoretical frameworks: UG-based and usage-based accounts. While most papers report a clear frequency effect, different factors that may be interacting with pure statistical effects are critically assessed. An introductory statement is provided by Thomas Roeper who calls for caution as he identifies frequency as a non-coherent concept and argues for a precise definition of what can and cannot be explained by statistical effects.

A Literary History of Reconciliation **Jul 07** 2020 From William Shakespeare to Marilynne Robinson, this book examines representations of interpersonal reconciliation in works of literature, focusing on how these representations draw on the language of divine forgiveness. Christian theology sees forgiveness as conditional upon a sinner's remorse and self-abasement before God, but also as a gift of grace - unconditional and rooted only in divine love. Van Dijkhuizen explores what happens when the paradoxical forgiveness paradigm comes to serve as a template for interpersonal reconciliation. The Literary History of Reconciliation shows, literary writers imagine interpersonal reconciliation centrally about power and hierarchy, and present forgiveness without power as longed for but elusive. Drawing on major works of literature from the early modern era to the present day, the book explores works by John Milton, Virginia Woolf, J.M. Coetzee, Ian McEwan and others to craft a

history that will appeal to readers interested in literature, religion and philosophy.

The Economic Limits to Modern Politics 2022 The central problem of modern government and political action is how to choose and implement effective economic policies. For this reason, the economic considerations of public policy have assumed a more prominent place in contemporary political thought. Despite efforts among political scientists, economists, and sociologists to face the complexities of this added dimension, none of these solid sciences offers a satisfying approach to the problem. This volume attempts to display the historical novelty and intellectual importance of the dilemma, to uncover its origins, and to procure a remedy through a clearer and steadier focus. The book's contributors range from historians of ideas to economic theorists, who bring the approach of their own intellectual discipline to bear upon the issue.

Writing the Nation in Reformation England, 1530-1580 2022 Writing the Nation in Reformation England offers a major re-evaluation of English writing between 1530 and 1580. Studying authors such as Andrew Borde, John Leland, William Thomas, Thomas Smith, and Thomas Wilson, Cathy Shraeger highlights the significance of these decades to the formation of English nationhood and examines the impact of the break with Rome on the development of a national language, literary style, and identity, as well as demonstrating the close relationship between literary culture and English identities, its influence on Tudor writers with a sense of agency. As authors, counsellors, and thinkers they were active participants in, and helping to shape, a national community. In the process, their works were used to project an image of themselves as authors, playing - and fitted to play - their part in the national domain. In showing how these writers engaged with, and promoted, concepts of national identity, this book makes a significant contribution to our broader understanding of the early modern period, demonstrating that nationhood was not a later Elizabethan phenomenon, and that the Reformation had an immediate impact on English culture, before England emerged as a 'Protestant' nation.
